




# Dear Friends,



### **Music Festival**

The Parish Council would like to thank the organisers of the recent AK Music Festival and congratulate them on a very successful event.

## **Best Kept Village Competition 2022**

Ashton Keynes came second in the North Wiltshire and Swindon Large Villages category of the Best Kept Village Competition this year, missing out on first place by just one point.

Below is a summary of the judges' report:

### ASHTON KEYNES

The first impression given by Ashton Keynes is excellent, with the juvenile Thames running through the village backed by beautifully kept front gardens, and further investigation along Church Walk showed more very well kept gardens and waterfront.

The Recreation ground and children's play area was extremely well maintained, with thoughtfully placed seating and some appealing new planting of trees.

The shop, telephone box gallery, garage and village hall were all in good order, and it was apparent that there was good community spirit and activities.

The gate to the Sports Ground and Millennium Green was locked, so we were not able to do more than inspect from the gate, but everything looked well maintained.

The report did go on to mention some areas of improvement (not Parish Council related) which we've noted and are discussing with the relevant people.

A full copy of the report can be found on the Parish Council's website.

The Parish Council would like to thank everyone for keeping the village tidy and Councillor Ventham for putting together our entry.

### **Parish Steward**

On his latest visit the steward strimmed around the railings at The Derry/High Road junction. He reported that the verge tractor had also visited the village, cutting junction verges and the Pot Hole gang have been round filling pot holes. Weed spraying along the High Road pavements and kerb edges is due to have been carried out on the steward's visit at the end of July.

Please do report any issues that can be dealt with by the Parish Steward, the type of works that can be reported to the Clerk are:

- Hand clearing and cutting of growth from drainage grips and drain gully covers.
- Hand clearing of blocked drainage gullies, grips, culverts, pipes and pits (unable to jet system).
- Clearing storm debris from the roads and footways.
- Pedestrian barriers preparation and painting.
- Cleaning and straightening of small road signs, street nameplates and bollards.
- Securing of existing small road signs, verge marker posts and supplied street name plates.
- Removal of limited graffiti from road signs, bollards and street nameplates.
- Hand cutting of grass and vegetation in visibility areas.
- Hand treatment of weeds.
- Hand clearance of encroaching growth and soils from footways.
- Repair of small potholes in roads and footways.



Reading and writing are an important part of our learning in Class R and during Term 6 we started using our new Phonics programme.

# Primary School

We've celebrated the Queen's Jubilee, created a sculpture for the sculpture trail, learnt all about life under the sea, grown our own vegetables, Pirate and Mermaid day, listened to countless stories, learnt new and exciting vocabulary, have become confident with numbers, and above all have had a lot of fun!

### Years 1 and 2

We have been loving our topic this term, 'The Great Fire of London' and have learnt so many new interesting facts. We have looked at the cause of the fire, how it destroyed houses and why it took so long to put out. The class have



done so much learning across the curriculum around this area of history. They enjoyed visiting our school outdoor timeline to see where this event happened in history! Class 2 have put their newfound recorder

playing skills to the test by rehearsing and performing a fantastic rendition of 'London's Burning' in their fabulous class assembly.

### Years 3 and 4

It has been a fantastic final term for us in Classes 3 and 4. Earlier this term, we visited the Ashmolean Museum to support our learning in our history topic - Ancient Egypt. 

# Leigh Parish Council Speed indicator Device and Highways Issues May and June 2022

The current speedwatch and counter device has been very busy over the last 2 months and again reveals some very interesting statistics. Within the month of May 2022 traffic monitored traveling south west and exceeding a set speed limit activation accounted for the following:

3429 record offending vehicles; these are verified and number plates can be clearly read.

Again there are at least 10% more vehicles daily that have activated the device but the registration details are not clear and cannot be recorded.

This would take the total to approx 3800 offending vehicles well exceeding the speed limit of 40mph.

- This is an average of 126 vehicles a day
- The average miles per hour is 52.45
- The top speed record is 67 mph
- The record and verified information is collated and forwarded onto the police for monitoring.

Figures for June mirrored that of May with basically the same amount of speeding vehicles.

There were 2 days over a weekend in June where the activated speeding vehicles were significantly reduced. This was achieved after a local person had parked a vehicle on the highway. This had a very positive outcome in reducing speed.

The parish council will actively request that the police review this information and will encourage them to look at setting up traffic monitoring.

## **Moving onto Highways issues**

Since the last news item was posted we have seen the whitelining around the Swan Lane area on the B4696 refreshed along with the SLOW road markings, also the highways department have replaced some of the missing signage.

On my final note, landowners are reminded as it is getting close to that time of year that it is their responsibility to make sure hedges do not encroach onto the highway or hinder visibility, and we would like to ask them where possible hedges are trimmed to make life on the road safer. Wishing you safe and happy travels.

# Electric vehicles - a glovebox sized guide

There is no doubt that an electric vehicle (EV) is a better private car option than one with an internal combustion engine (ICE), but manufacturing an EV does have a higher carbon impact than that of making an ICE car, on account of the battery. However, the extra manufacturing 'debt' will be repaid in approximately two years, based on average milage in an average sized EV on UK grid electricity. (About 1.5 tonnes of CO2e a year) As the average life of a car in the UK is 13 years, electrics are definitely worth it in climate terms if you are buying a new car anyway. Savings will also increase as the grid decarbonises further.



What about hybrids? A major 2021 study by the International Council on Clean Transportation looked at real-world driving of around 100,000 plug-in hybrids and found emissions to be two to four times higher than that claimed by official values, primarily because they weren't really being charged very often and therefore the battery wasn't being used much (a plug-in hybrid runs on battery until it runs out of power, then switches to the ICE). With this in mind, it brings their lifetime emissions more in line with conventional ICE vehicles.

"All hybrid models have claimed economy figures that, in real world driving, are simply not achievable" states www.thisismoney.co.uk

Of course not everyone can afford a brand new EV and it is good to know that there is a growing and very active second-hand market, with thousands available to choose from. The website nextgreencar.com is a great place to sort your options with real-world data on emissions.

## In Summary:

### What to buy:

- An EV, if your current car is an older ICE
- A second-hand EV

## What not to buy:

- A diesel ICE. The human health impacts are too great and almost all companies and governments are phasing them out entirely.
- A plug-in hybrid. Latest data suggests that, unless used carefully, they aren't any better for the climate than conventional ICE cars.

So if you are changing your car, go fully electric as the evidence seems clear that a hybrid is a 'green' herring.

# b Aunty Planty's news & top gardening tips

August brings the summer hiatus until the longer days start to wane slowly, and there may be gaps in the border as the earlier herbaceous perennials go over. Dead heading is still very important. If you have already cut back some of the straggly perennials, then you should be seeing a flush of new growth which will produce a new flush of flowers to keep the borders looking colourful for weeks to come.

There are plenty of plants to brighten up the garden in August and beyond. Rudbeckias, Japanese anemones, sedums (now renamed hylotelephium), chrysanthemums, asters, fuchsias, grasses and late flowering clematis and roses will give colour late in the autumn so worth making space for them. Echinaceas bring spectacular colour and structure to the border with its cone-shaped flower heads, and a recent RHS trial of over 400 should result in some new varieties available in garden centres to spice up the garden. One of my late summer favourite plants is Helianthus 'Lemon Queen'. It is tall, it can reach 6ft, but if you have a sunny spot at the back of the border, then give it a try. It will flower from now right through to the end of autumn if you keep deadheading it. Flat, open flower heads are great for pollinators, so a variety of these plants will provide a great source of nectar late into the season.

August is a great time of year to think ahead, and look for seed heads that can be collected and saved. It's the easiest and most natural way to grow more of your favourite plants for free.

The best time to collect seeds is on a dry day, after a spell of dry weather, and around midmorning, once any dew has evaporated. Seed heads that dry, such as aquilegia, lupins, love-in-a mist, sweet peas or poppies, should rattle. Others, like lychnis, will need drying out first before storing. Always place dry seeds into a paper envelope or bag, label them and keep in a cool place till planting in the spring. Avoid storing seeds in polythene bags, which trap moisture and encourage mould.

Take salvia cuttings now as they are easy to root and good insurance in case you lose any plants over winter. Choose shoots that haven't flowered yet or pinch out the flower heads if none other available, collecting them in the morning preferably. Put into a plastic bag with a few drops of water and keep cool until ready to pot up. They will need humidity to root, put them in a propagator or plastic bag which can be tied up and place out of direct sunlight. Air them regularly and take out of the propagator once they start growing.

Agapanthus are a delight this time of the year but look out for signs that they might need some attention. If there a lack of, or poor flowering, after years of flowering well or lots of roots emerging from the drainage holes at the base, the plant will need repotting. Agapanthus likes its roots to be constricted so when you repot it, you should only move up one pot size bigger. If you need to split it, then repot into a pot that the plant fits in to snuggly as restriction will force plenty of thick white roots and encourage them to flower. A new plant should be repotted after two years, then every four years after that. This is best done in the spring as doing it later in the year will result in less chance of flowers.

Deciduous agapanthus (A. campanulatus hybrids) have narrow leaves that die back in winter, and these are the most reliable for planting in the ground if you have good drainage and a sunny spot. The A. praecox types have strappy leaves and bigger flowerheads, and tend to be the evergreen ones which may need some winter protection. They are probably better grown in pots so they can be moved into a cool greenhouse or porch for over wintering.

# flowers

If you are not happy with the layout of your borders as the garden changes over the seasons, i.e. the structure/height of the plants is out of alignment for their best growing position, seasonal colour doesn't flow and you have big gaps, then this is a good time to assess the layout. Make rough sketches of your flower borders, noting where plants are now and plan where to move them in the autumn, an ideal time for splitting and transplanting. Take lots of photos of your garden too as it's much easier to do this if you have a reference point.

## Top tips for this month

- Feed camellias and rhododendrons with an ericaceous fertiliser and keep well-watered through late summer while their flower buds are forming.
- Trim back lavender, once flowering is over, by between a third and a half, cutting off all the old flowerheads (bring them indoors to a room scenter) and a little foliage to maintain a compact, bushy shape, but avoid cutting into old wood.
- Prune wisteria after flowering by removing all the whippy side-shoots from the branch framework to about 20cm from their base (about five leaves from the main stem).
- Prune rambling roses, removing up to a third of stems that have flowered, and tie the rest to supports.
- Prune all summer flowering shrubs, such as climbing hydrangeas, once the blooms are finished.
- Leave the flowerheads of ornamental grasses as they will provide winter interest.
- Plant autumn bulbs, such as colchicums, sternbergia and nerines, in pots and borders.
- Plant up pots with 'Paper White' narcissus bulbs for fragrant indoor displays this Christmas.

- Summer prune both free-standing and trained apple trees, to encourage good fruiting in future years.
- Start planning your spring flowering bulb displays for planting over autumn. The garden centres will start getting bulbs in stock now to tempt you with a wide range of bulbs and colour.
- Lift onions and shallots once their tops die down, then leave to dry in the sun or on a warm greenhouse shelf.
- Cut back herbs now to encourage a new flush of tasty leaves you can harvest before the frost.
- Pinch out the tips of your runner bean plants once they reach the top of their support. This encourages side-shooting and more beans at a manageable height for picking.
- Summer prune both free-standing and trained apple trees, to encourage good fruiting in future years.

### This made me smile:

My friend visited a nursery in her search for bedding plants. Pointing to one, she asked the nurseryman "Are these the kind that come back every year?" "No," he replied. "They die and you come back every year!"

I am taking a break from writing this article due to family and personal commitments so I wish you happy times in your garden – there is no better place to be.



# **North Wiltshire Villages Flower Club**



### **Cricklade Landmark**

Cricklade Surgery is unique in the modern NHS as it is still essentially a single-handed practice. It has only had three GPs in post since the end of World War 2. Dr TRF Thomson was the GP at Cricklade Surgery from 1945 to 1972 (27 years). Prior to that he had been in the Army. Dr SS Banerjee was the GP here from 1972 to 1995 (23 years). Prior to that he was a GP in Devon and before this in Wales. Dr Lanil de Silva, the current post holder, has been in post here since 1st July 1995 – to the present day which is over 27 years. Before that he was a Hospital Doctor in various specialties. Between them there have been three GPs in post over a period of 77 years. The length of time that each Doctor was here is worthy of comment.

Dr de Silva would like to add that his job has been made possible for this length of time and in the modern NHS because of the excellent staff he has around him at Cricklade Surgery.

## Cheers! New brewery brings a cash bonus for Cotswold Lakes Trust

When seven friends set up the Cotswold Lakes Brew Co during the pandemic, they pledged to give back to their local community.

That promise was honoured when they handed over a £200 cheque to Cotswold Lakes Trust – the equivalent of 1% of gross sales revenue in the burgeoning brewery's first year. "We're lucky to be based in the beautiful Cotswold Water Park and are keen to help keep it that way," said Lee Selway, founding partner of the Cotswold Lakes Brew Co. "Supporting Cotswold Lakes Trust was an obvious option - it's a charity dedicated to the conservation and enhancement of the Cotswold Water Park for the benefit of wildlife and people."

Development Director of Cotswold Lakes Trust Matthew Millett thanked the brewery for their support. "It's great to get the backing of local businesses. And the fact that we share the same values in protecting the environment and doing the best for the Cotswold Water Park is a real bonus," he said.

first beer at a pop-up event in South Cerney, and since then have produced more than 15,000 pints.

"We set out to create the best-tasting beers we could," said Lee. At the same time they wanted their idea to be about more than beer. "We wanted to make a positive difference in our local community and more widely. It's what we call 'beer with purpose'," he added. "Our support of Cotswold Lakes Trust is a long-term commitment that will hopefully grow to become a financially significant partnership."

# **Closure of local Rotary Club**

It is with great sadness that we report that the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds closed with effect from 30 June 2022. The Club was chartered in June 1967 and had as its first President Charles Nicholls, the popular manager of Lloyds Bank in Tetbury, who continued to be an active member of the Club until his death in December 2020 aged 96.

The Club was based on the two towns of Malmesbury and Tetbury, historically great local rivals! Initially the club met weekly with one week in Tetbury and the other week in Malmesbury. Over the years it has met in a number of locations including the Kings Arms in Malmesbury, the Horse Guards at Brokenborough, the Mayfield at Crudwell and finally at the Old Royal Ship at Luckington.

Throughout its 55 year history the Club has carried out numerous activities raising hundreds of thousands of pounds for both local and national charities. In addition to its fund raising events, community service projects were carried out. A key one for Malmesbury was the annual Santa Sleigh – that toured streets in Malmesbury and in a number of the surrounding villages. The most notable for Tetbury was the annual "Fireworks Spectacular" last held in November 2019. This provided a safe environment for people to enjoy a superb pyrotechnic display at an affordable cost (far cheaper and more spectacular than buying the usual family box of fireworks!) - and visited one

year by a certain Mrs Diana Wales and her two sons from nearby Highgrove.

The Club has also, through the wider Rotary movement, engaged in International Activities. Old tools were collected for the 'Tools for Self Reliance' project in Africa, computers were procured to be sent to South Africa and the Sight Savers initiative was strongly supported with millions of eye patches supplied. More locally, the club made significant contributions to the Brighter Futures project to provide radiotherapy facilities at the Great Western Hospital and to the Life Education Centre (LEC) mobile classroom that visits many of the primary schools in Malmesbury and the surrounding villages.

When the Club was originally Chartered most of the members were in their 40s, but as with all organisations the members get older and unfortunately we were not able to attract new younger members in sufficient numbers to continue. Times, family priorities and work pressures have changed, and the absence of a single geographical focus did not help.

However we have had a good run and achieved a lot of good over the past 55 years through our enthusiasm, teamwork and capabilities – and lots of fun and fellowship.


